

PROVINCIAL CHAPTER REPORT

Members of Provincial Chapter met together 13 to 15 February at Launde Abbey with a very full agenda, among which were Formation, Planning for *Francis 800*, Reviewing our Priorities on Outward-facing Projects and Pastoral Care in the Order.

Chapter bade a fond farewell to Tony Ross, who has been acting as Link Tertiary for Wales, West Midlands, Severn, and the Marches for longer than he had originally anticipated. In his place Chapter welcomed Millicent Dews. Also welcomed were Alan Williams as Provincial Communications Guardian (PCG) and Julia Barrett as Coordinator of Enquiries and Referrals.

Francis 800: over the next two years we will be celebrating the events leading up to Francis' death. Chapter looked at themes and activities, ideas for working with others and an action plan for turning ideas into reality. Chapter backed the direction of travel and spirit of the programme presented by the Provincial Formation Guardian (PFG) and agreed to devote a substantial sum to its fruition. In order to help us all to celebrate this milestone it is hoped that Clusters, Areas and Groups will engage with events as they take place and take part in some months of preparatory study starting at either Francistide or Advent this year. We must also remember that it will not just be the Anglicans and Lutherans celebrating, but also our Roman Catholic friends.

Reviewing our Outward-facing Priorities –

Chapter first identified the many projects already running and secondly shared ideas about what more might be done. There will be a further review in 12 months. The photo shows the fruits of our labour!

The PCG takes the view that **effective communication** is a two-way street, and that each of us as Tertiaries have to take responsibility for what we communicate and how we receive information.



Robert Dimmick, Provincial Treasurer, presented the **interim annual accounts**, and several grants were approved for on-going Franciscan work, or work by Franciscans.

We also discussed ethnicity, a further topic designed to encourage **inclusion** in our Order. Hopefully, in the not too distant future, our website will host a page of resources named Diversity Matters.

In matters of **Safeguarding** we are delighted that Rebecca Faal will continue to advise us for the next year. She helped members of Chapter in updating the Order's Safeguarding dashboard, which will be familiar to all Parish Safeguarding Officers. We worked through our Safeguarding Policies and procedures and agreed an Action Plan.

The **Link Tertiaries** each brought us up to date about their Areas, and a Working Party was set up to consider positive recommendations in cases where posts are difficult to fill.

Chapter received updates about current **Outward-facing Projects**: the Spiritual Direction Course; the joint conference between the Third Order and the Community of the Cross of Nails in 2026; on TSSF Eco-ministry; and on *Making Christ Known* and the latest draft of the Travelling Light booklet, which gives a simple outline of each day's Principle; and the Young Franciscans (YF) project – there is to be a booklet issued outlining the history of YF.

Chapter discussed **Pastoral Care** within the Order, and noted that Areas generally made good informal arrangements and that only one Area

had appointed a Pastoral Care Coordinator, as provided for in the Area Team Handbook. The Working Party would draft a more flexible provision for Areas to make the best arrangements they are able for loving pastoral care. Future guidance might well ask Area Teams to have a standing item about Pastoral Care on their agenda, in the same way as Safeguarding.

There was a discussion about the best way of encouraging one another to **treat each other well** within the Order, as a way of expressing the love that Tertiaries should hold for one another. This is largely the case, but sometimes, this is not evident! Chapter will develop and trial a Charter based on our Principles. After that, the Minister Provincial will discuss with Area Ministers the best way forward. All agreed, that our Principles are clear on these matters.

Much ground was covered in the 48 hours Chapter met together. Business was **surrounded by prayer**, and meditation; we were pleased to be joined by our Bishop Protector Martyn Snow for the final morning and he presided at our final joyful Eucharist.

Future residential Chapter dates are: 12-14 June and 16-18 October.

I am taking on a couple of challenges by fundraising for charities that I support. Please see the extract from the Justgiving Page. I will not be starting my walk until Saturday 2 August. **An offer is made to match-fund, up to £500 for Franciscan Aid**, which is quite a tidy sum, I believe.

Would anyone be willing to offer overnight accommodation during the walk, as near to the trail as possible – a corner in a village hall or church would be helpful (but I would love it if a spare bed might be on offer, of course!) – for a small donation, which I will pay out of my own funds. I would just ask for a means of getting some hot water, and a loo and hopefully, a shop or pub fairly close at hand where I can purchase food.

All being well, my planned overnight stops are likely to be Wallingford, Abingdon, Oxford, Newbridge, Lechlade and Cricklade

Of course, if anyone would like to walk alongside me for their stage of the journey, they would be most welcome!

I'd like to hear as soon as possible from anyone who think they might be able to help so that I can get my plans in order. I hope to raise a minimum of £1,000 to pay towards completion of the building works at St Mary's Church, Hampstead Norreys - Phase 2 of Project Vision - which will provide much-needed facilities to make the building a more user-friendly space. These will include a servery and a loo!

Phase 1 found me walking over 150 km during March last year. This year, as I celebrate my 80th birthday, I will be walking the Thames Path from Pangbourne to the river's source in Gloucestershire in one go - a minimum of 86 miles.

FROM SOLENT AREA

Holding the challenge of communications in our Order today: For many, the advent of IT and internet access has been great. Emails, zoom and accessing information on line has meant that we can keep in touch, video call, and respond to issues and concerns promptly and keep more people 'in touch'. However, this is a step into the unknown still, with some continuing to recoil at the very thought.

As an Area Secretary and Communications Officer (we merged the two roles in our Area – it made sense), I find that the majority of folk are fine with the more immediate and more carbon neutral options, but the challenge remains of some who cannot engage this way. Our Zoom licence is now an annual charge within our Area finances, and I cannot see a time when it will not be well used. Coupled with the increasing number of our Order who are increasingly infirm and less mobile, there is a challenge of inclusion and ensuring that people are retained in the communications loop and their sense of belonging and value is not diminished.

Our challenge is to tread this path, and accompany those of reduced mobility, who are

often the same who find it increasingly difficult to contemplate a more digital presence; and so the conflation of the two challenges increases their sense of isolation. What is the answer?

Perhaps we need to see the Small Group as a tool of extending that pastoral inclusion. The Small Group is the place for those to be mindful of sharing and including for their less mobile, and less tech aware members of what is going on, and to think how we can take the Order to them - in their space. We have seen the benefit of doing this, in a small way, and meeting when we can at the home of those for whom travel is becoming impossible, and the grasping of a Zoom call remains remote. We are thinking of ways of doing more, but the tension of time availability and ability weighs with us all.

Our presence and involvement perhaps is the antidote to this, in an imperfect and sporadic way. I do not think we can completely 'solve' this challenge, and I wonder if mobility will impact more as time passes. We can offer to include, to share time and opportunity, and importantly, to be aware that these barriers to inclusion exist, and to see how we as individuals and Small

Groups can commit to ensuring that the most remote of us can remain in our hearts and shared times together.

In simple terms, I wonder if we are hearing a call for a more pastoral thread within our Order at this time.

AN UPDATE FROM FRANCISCAN AID

Franciscan Aid is the 'Family Charity' of TSSF, working with those most in need across the world.

Applications are discussed at our trustees' meetings which are held three times a year. Each application must have a Project Link who is a member of the First, Second or Third Orders of SSF, they are then responsible for monitoring how the grant money is spent and providing reports.

Because we have limited funds we do not normally fund building projects, wages or school fees, but each application is carefully discussed.

At each meeting we have around £25,000 to £30,000 to share between applications, and examples of recent grants are:

- a project in Zimbabwe for school uniforms, public toilets, water tanks and solar pumps.
- a parish in Madagascar hit by a devastating cyclone, for food and materials to repair people's homes
- equipment for a school in Sri Lanka
- to WASH, an organisation providing sanitary equipment to teenage girls in Ethiopia, and ongoing training in menstrual hygiene. Many teenage girls stay away from school during their periods
